



- Materials needed:

| Basic sewing kit  | Crackle medium                           |
| 1/8" yd. muslin   | Small scrap of lace                      |
| Stuffing  | Paper butterfly                          |
| Blush   | Five gold beads                          |
| Brown and black gel pen                                   | One charm                                |
| Paint: Terra cotta, orange and green, dark tan, off white | Gold lamé yarn                           |
|   | 1 stem of 32 gage green floral wire stem |

- Cut bunny on doubled muslin; sew around bunny's head and body, leave opening in side of body for stuffing.
- Clip curves, turn.
- Stitch each ear across as shown in diagram, drawstring and tie off, stuff head and body firmly.
- Paint body and head with dark Tan, let completely dry, paint one layer of crackle over dark Tan, let dry. Paint over crackle with off white do not go back over any area, one coat only. As bunny dries, you will see the crackling.
- Paint hair using Terra Cotta, guidelines shown on diagram. Let dry.
- Stitch and drawstring small scrap of lace, glue to the side of bunny's head, add small paper butterfly by gluing in place.
- Draw in facial features using chart and gel pens, or your choice. Blush cheeks.

**Carrot:**

- Using doubled muslin cut from pattern piece; sew carrot up, turn, stuff, stitch around top of carrot turning down small edges, drawstring, and tie off.
- Paint carrot Orange. Let dry.
- Make bunny's arms and costuming using Angel of Stress/ Protector of Chocolate pattern.
- Use bunny head and body as a replacement.
- Snip off 6" green floral stem; insert floral stem wire into each hand and into the carrot. Twist wires together. Use the end of your paintbrush to curl wires into a floral stem.
- Cut leaves from one piece of muslin, drawstring bottom of leaves as shown.
- Paint leaves green, when dry glue on top of carrot.
- Hang charm from gold lame yarn.
